### TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

July 13, 2021

### Town Hall

Town Hall has been open since June 22 and we have had a very positive response from those residents who have come in for services. Although many of us are here earlier and later we have posted hours from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday to ensue that most of the offices are open at the same time. We are looking into the option of providing evening hours once or twice a month and welcome feedback from this board as well as the public.

### **Special Election**

We will bring back to you at your next meeting a warrant for the Special Election on Aug. 31<sup>st</sup> to affirm the school borrowing. All of the District Towns approved the spending through their Town Meetings but Buckland is likely the only town with an outstanding debt exclusion vote. Ashfield had its debt exclusion vote (passed) on the same day as its ATM and it seems as though no other town had a debt exclusion contingency.

The District is working with their finance team on a borrowing package that best fits the district communities budgets. There will be a joint meeting with finance committee, selectboard and school committee members to discuss the options. It will be helpful to have some of the information before the election so voters understand the impact it will have on their property tax bills.

### ARPA Disbursement

We received our first American Rescue Plan allocation of \$92,000. It is in an account with a big do-not touch sign on it. As a non-entitlement and non-county community we are scheduled to receive \$552,978.

Some of the prescribed uses are:

- Support public health expenditures, by, for example, funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff
- Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector
- Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic
- Provide premium pay for essential workers, offering additional support to those who
  have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical
  infrastructure sectors
- Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments
  to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater
  infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet.

The guidance from the state has been that if the Town determines what project it would like to do they should bring it forward for review by local services.

### Alternative Mosquito Plan approved

The Town of Buckland received word from the Office of Energy & Environmental Affairs Opt-Out Team that the Town's request to opt of the state's spraying program was successful. Thank you to Marti Taft Ferguson and Peggy Hart for the hours spent completing the application and creating the alternate plan.

### Ashfield Street & Charlemont Road

Work will be starting on the Lower Ashfield Street Improvements and Downtown Sidewalks replacement project the week of July 19. The Town would like to meet with the impacted residents, businesses, and property owners to bring you up to date on the construction plans.

**TRAFFIC and PARKING** -- Detours around Lower Ashfield Street are likely during the water main installation. Police details will be used to control traffic, as directed by the Police Chief. Paving will require that traffic be detoured.

A pre-construction meeting for Charlemont Road will be Monday morning. Notices will be distributed to residents once a date for the construction is set and a traffic plan is formed.

And in related news we have been invited to a grant announcement event tomorrow. The grant is the Department of Environmental Restoration program which we applied to for \$88,700 to engineer the replacement of the Charlemont Road culvert with a suitably sized bridge or a three-sided precast box culvert. I don't want to count our chickens but typically you don't get invited to the party unless you are guaranteed a goody bag.

### **Shared Streets – Conway Street**

We did find out that we will – for sure – receive \$50,000 to complete a small cycle-themed pocket park on Conway Street on the property owned by Mike McCusker. The Town will work with attorneys to convey the land through a donation and then use the funds to do some much needed landscaping to create an area suitable for benches, bike racks, a water bottle filling station and a bike mechanics tool stand.

To Whom it May Concern,

M.G.L. Chapter 252, Section 2A(b)(2) requires EEA to establish a process to allow a municipality to request to opt out of mosquito control spraying, either aerial or ground-based, conducted by the State Reclamation and Mosquito Control Board ("SRMCB") under M.G.L. c. 252, Section 2A(a). For the SRMCB to recognize a municipal opt out, the municipality must first have an alternative management plan ("plan") approved by the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs ("EEA").

In accordance with M.G.L. c. 252, Section 2A(b)(2), EEA has reviewed your municipality's plan. EEA assessed the impact of your municipality's alternative plan on regional mosquito control should your request to opt-out be approved, with consideration for historical arbovirus risk and with consideration for strength of plan submission. The impact of your plan as compared to mosquito control conducted by the SRMCB is rated as *minimal or low regional risk*. As a result, in accordance with M.G.L. c. 252, Section 2A(b)(2), EEA has made a determination to approve your plan for 2021. This determination will be shared with the SRMCB so that it can take the necessary steps to recognize the opt out under the statute.

When executing your plan, please be aware that approval of this plan does not relieve an applicant of the necessity of complying with all applicable federal, state or local statutes, ordinances, bylaws or regulations, including but not limited to those administered by your local Conservation Commission, Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, and Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife. Further, your municipality's opt out does not extend to state-owned land within your municipality's boundaries.

Despite approval, there remain substantial opportunities for improvement in all plan submissions this year. This includes the existence of and quality of alternative mosquito control management



### Ashfield Street & Downtown Sidewalks CONSTRUCTION KICK-OFF MEETING

Work will be starting on the Lower Ashfield Street Improvements and Downtown Sidewalks replacement project the week of July 19. The Town would like to meet with the impacted residents, business and property owners to bring you up to date on the construction plans.

The project engineer and representatives from the Town and Shelburne Falls Fire and Sewer Districts will be present at the meeting to answer your questions. The Town of Buckland has received a Community Development Block Grant to repair a section of Ashfield Street, from the Clement Street intersection to the Green Street Intersection. The Town also received a Complete Streets Grant to replace the sidewalks on Ashfield Street from the Green Street intersection to Spring Street as well as several sections on State Street, north of the Ashfield Street intersection. A. Martins Construction of Ludlow has been contracted to complete the repairs, which will include sidewalk and curb replacement and repair, new road pavement, new water lines and hydrants, and sewer repair.

### THE SCOPE OF WORK:

**Sidewalks** - Sidewalks in the project areas will be replaced to eliminate uneven, unsafe surfaces and to provide a consistent slope and width. Sidewalk ramp transitions will be made ADA compliant and curbs will be reset to better align with sidewalk.

Water system – Grant funds will install a new water main from Green Street, under the railroad tracks, down the length of Ashfield Street to tie into the existing main on State Street. In addition, new water services will be brought from the new main to the property line and connected to the existing building service.

Water System Installation – Tentative Start Date, week of July 19. Duration:
Approximately 3 weeks. Work will begin with the installation of a new water main and services to buildings in the project area. While this work is underway, the contractor will install a temporary water line to provide safe, potable water to all buildings in the project. Cutover from the old water system to the temporary water supply will result in a short interruption of service; the contractor will provide a minimum 72 hours of notice when the cutover will occur. Once all buildings are on the temporary water service, the contractor will begin installing the new main.

**Ashfield Street Sewer Repair** – A 30 LF section of Lower Ashfield Street will be repaired and a new sewer manhole installed.

**Paving and sidewalks** – Lower Ashfield Street: The road surface will be reclaimed, graded and a new layer of pavement laid after the water and sewer system repairs are completed. Final road surface paving will occur after Labor Day. Upper Ashfield and State Streets: Sidewalks will be removed and replaced.

### TRAFFIC and PARKING

Detours around Lower Ashfield Street are likely during the water main installation. Police details will be used to control traffic, as directed by the Police Chief. Paving will require that traffic be detoured.

### Dear Heather Butler:

Thank you for submitting a project application to the MassDOT Shared Streets and Spaces Program. Your project application has been reviewed, and we are pleased to notify you that your Hybrid: Main Streets and Safe Streets and Paths project has been approved for funding. We received many applications and had a competitive applicant pool from which to select, and your application stood out. Buckland's Hybrid: Main Streets and Safe Streets and Paths project will be funded at \$50,000.00 under Chapter 90 Contract Number/ MMARS #50751. Ongoing maintenance, operational, and enforcement costs associated with a project are not eligible uses of this funding.

The Shared Streets and Spaces Program is intended to support projects that promote public health, safe mobility, and renewed commerce by providing new or repurposed space for socially-distanced walking, bicycling, dining, retail, civic activities, and bus travel. Because of the urgency of this effort, the Buckland project will need to be fully implemented by December 31, 2021. Please note that any pavement markings or signage included in your project that are not compliant with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices should be used with caution, and only on a temporary basis. Please feel free to contact the Shared Streets Team to discuss this issue in more detail, if needed.

Upon project completion, award recipients are required to submit a post-construction report, which will be provided to the municipality by MassDOT. We also ask that you document the project's progress by taking before, during and after photos of your Shared Streets and Spaces installation.

We are excited to work with you and the full Buckland team as this project advances.
